OLD BUSINESS:

Robert Fuqua made a motion to approve the minutes of the February 2023 meeting. Norma Yarbrough seconded. The motion passed.

Dana Tiblier gave a report on bank balances, excess expenses, reserve funds, delinquent accounts, finances, rental units, work orders, and early reports of storm damage.

In January the board approved a bid to raise and level the pool deck. The vendor, upon further examination, decided the job they initially thought would work was not feasible. The board will seek further remedies and bids for the work.

NEW BUSINESS:

Robert Fuqua made a motion to approve a bid from Anchor Financial Group to perform the annual audit of Heritage Village. Larry Butler seconded. The motion passed.

Norma Yarbrough made a motion to accept a bid from DrainMaster Plumbing to repair the water shutoff valve at unit 1033. Larry Butler seconded. The motion passed.

The meeting adjourned at 8:05 p.m. The next meeting will be Tuesday, April 4, 2023 at 6 p.m. This will be an executive meeting.
